



Dr. Umar Abdullah-Johnson

Educator, Psychologist, Political Scientist and Pan-Africanist

Dr. Abdullah-Johnson is a Nationally Certified School Psychologist who practices privately throughout Pennsylvania and lectures throughout the country. He is also a blood relative of Frederick Douglas, the great Black abolitionist and orator.

Mr. Abdullah-Johnson is considered a national expert on learning disabilities and their effect on Black children, as well as assisting schools and parents modify challenging behaviors that can ultimately lead to disruptive behavior disorder diagnoses in Black boys. He also

has extensive experience in evaluating children 3-21 years of age in a effort to determine if they have educational disabilities and a need for special education services. For five years Mr. Abdullah-Johnson served as the youngest of five African-American male school psychologists in the 5th largest public school district in America-The School District of Philadelphia.

As a child therapist, Mr. Abdullah-Johnson specializes in working with at-risk, violent, suicidal and depressed African-American boys and girls.

Mr. Abdullah-Johnson is a highly sought after motivational speaker who has lectured on a diverse array of topics such as: Special Education Law, ADHD and Black Boys, Post-Traumatic Slavery Disorder, Effective Parenting Practices, Understanding Depression in Black Children, and The Over-Identification of Black Children as Mentally Retarded and Learning Disabled.

Mr. Abdullah-Johnson is the founder and Chief Scout Master of two independent Pan-African Mentorship Programs for Youth: Emmett Till, Hector Peterson and Scottsboro Boys Pan-African Boy Scouts Program and the Queen Nzingah, Harriet Tubman and Birmingham Four Pan-African Girl Scouts Program.
